From the Heart of Your Shepherd

"In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God...And the Word became flesh and dwelt among us, and we have seen His glory, glory of the only Son from the Father, full of grace and truth" John 1:1;14

When we think of Christmas, we think of the story of shepherds on the hills outside of Bethlehem. We think of angels delivering a message of good news and great joy. All of those images come from the $2^{\rm nd}$ chapter of Luke's Gospel account. They shape our image of the Christmas events.

However, it is John's Gospel account that greatly adds to our understanding of what was happening in Bethlehem. John tells us that in the beginning was the Word. He tells us that the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He goes on to tell us that the Word became flesh and dwelt among us. Jesus is referred to as the Word in John's Gospel. This tells us some very important things about Jesus and tells us what Christmas is all about. It tells us first of all that Jesus is God. He is the second person of the Trinity. This tells us that God Himself came down into the world at Christmas and took on human flesh and blood. He did this that He might accomplish our salvation.

But what does it mean that Jesus is referred to as the Word? In John's Gospel, Jesus is referred to as the Light of the Word, the Way, the Good Shepherd, and other things. All of those things tell us something about Jesus and what He does for us. But what does it mean to say that Jesus is the Word? That can seem a bit strange to us. What it is referring to is the fact that when God speaks His words have power. We think of God speaking at creation and calling into being the creation itself. Jesus is that powerful Word of God. Jesus is God speaking to us.

What happens when God speaks to us? That Word of God is just as powerful today as ever. God comes to us and speaks words of joy and peace to us at Christmas. He comes to us and tells us that our sins are forgiven. He tells us the good news of all that Jesus has done for us. God comes to us through His powerful Word and creates faith in our hearts that we must trust in Jesus and be filled with true Christmas joy. We will receive that eternal Word once again this Christmas Season. That is the true gift of Christmas. I hope you have a very blessed Christmas as we celebrate that eternal Word coming into our world and accomplishing our salvation.

Sermon Texts and Titles

- December 4 & 7: The sermon text for the Second Sunday in Advent will be the Gospel reading from Matthew 3:1-12. The title of the sermon will be "Christmas Preparations." Our world started getting ready for Christmas even before Thanksgiving. John talks about true Christmas preparations. He talks about preparing our hearts for the coming of the Savior.
- December 11 & 14: The sermon text for the Third Sunday in Advent will be the Gospel reading from Matthew 11:2-15. The title of the sermon will be "Great Expectations." Advent is a time of great expectations. What are you expecting from Christmas? Will your expectations be met? That will depend on whether or not you have the right expectations. We are told in our Gospel reading what it is that we can expect from Christmas.
- **December 18 & 21:** The school Christmas program will take place on Thursday evening. The Sunday School Christmas program will take place on Sunday morning.
- December 24: The text for Christmas Eve will be the epistle reading from Titus 2:11-14. The title of the sermon will be "Grace has Appeared." Our epistle reading tells us the meaning of all of the events that took place in Bethlehem with the birth of Jesus. We are told that grace has appeared. That is the gift that we receive at Christmas, and that is the gift that we truly need. Jesus was God's undeserved love coming into the world in order to pay for our sins and overcome death for us.
- December 25: The sermon text for Christmas Day will be the Gospel reading from John 1:1-18. The Christmas account from Luke tells us about the human side of Jesus. We see how Jesus was born as a child into this world roughly two thousand years ago. The Gospel from John tells us that Jesus has existed forever. We see Jesus' divine nature in the Gospel of John. We see that Jesus was true God coming into the world to do that which we could not do. Jesus is described as the Word. Jesus is God speaking to us and telling us of our salvation.
- **December 28:** The First Sunday of Christmas tells us of Mary and Joseph having to take Jesus and flee to Egypt. We also see the slaughter of the innocents in Bethlehem. We see that not everyone is excited to hear about this newborn king-especially King Herod. It is no different today. We receive the good news of a Savior, but we know that there are those in our world today who do not receive this gift of the Savior.



Stewardship News and Views

"We ask you, brothers, to respect those who labor among you and are over you in the Lord and admonish you, and to esteem them very highly in love because of their work. Be at peace among yourselves" (1 Thess. 5:12-13).

Have you finished your Christmas shopping yet? Do you have a person or two on your list that you just don't know what to give them? While I know you are running short of ideas...dad doesn't really want another tie, and your kid's teacher doesn't need another coffee mug. It can be nothing short of maddening to try to figure things out in the middle of this busy season!

As stewards of all of life and life's resources, we know that life is more than giving gifts. We stewards never want to take anything the Lord provides for granted. During this season of Advent and Christmas, it is a great idea to do whatever you can to be a faithful steward of your pastor. Even more so than the rest of the year, the demands on their time, their presence and their stewardship of the Gospel in the congregation become heightened.

The demands on pastors can wear them down and wear them out. How does the steward in the congregation serve as a faithful steward of the treasure that is their pastor? Here are a few ideas:

- Put them at the top of your prayer list. Pray that the Lord guards them against the weariness that makes them susceptible to the work of the devil.
- Make worship a priority St. Paul admonishes the Thessalonians and us to respect those who labor among us. There is no greater way to steward your pastor than to respect him enough to show up and receive what he has been sent to offer in the proclamation of the Gospel and administration of the Holy Sacraments.
- Be receptive to his work If your pastor is tasked with calling you to repentance or encouraging you to be in worship, know that he is only caring for your soul.
- Esteem him highly Take the time to thank him for his faithful service to Christ, the congregation and your family.
- Be at peace This is an easy time for even minor annoyances to get blown out of proportion and become full-blown conflict. This not only spoils the season of Advent and Christmas, but it also spoils our stewardship of the Gospel and those who serve us in that Gospel. Remember that Jesus came into the world to be the Prince of Peace. This is an act of grace and mercy. The steward seeks to reflect this toward their pastor and their brothers and sisters in Christ.


Fruit Baskets will be available for pickup in the school gym on Sunday, December 7^{th} .

Stamps for Missions

The stamp ministry for missions continues and a thank you to all who have contributed.

Since 1993, Lutheran Women in Mission across the Northern Wisconsin District have been clipping and sending in canceled postage stamps. You can, too.

The Lutheran Women's Missionary League NWD invites you to save postage stamps. Please ask your friends, neighbors, co-workers, and those with large volumes of mail to save for you.

Please purchase commemorative stamps when you purchase stamps instead of common stamps. The commemorative stamp costs the same as regular stamps. We would get more money per pound for the commemorative stamps because they are larger than common stamps.

Here are some questions you may have:

Can we collect and send flag stamps? Yes, our dealer accepts flag stamps.

Can we collect and send postcards? Yes, but postcards that are dated 1950 or earlier; please send
the whole card. Do not cut the postcard.

Can we collect and send nonprofit stamps? Yes, our dealer accepts nonprofit stamps.

 Can we send post office metered stamps? No, our dealer will not accept metered stamps from the Post Office.

Can I collect and send new (unused) stamps? Yes, our dealer accepts new (unused) stamps.

Can I send in my old stamps? Yes, if you think you may have some old stamps that may be of
value, please place them in a separate envelope or box and mark the packaging "special stamps."
 This way our dealer may look at them and determine the value of the stamps.

When mailing a card to a loved one remember to place your stamp in the upper right-hand corner, allowing space around the edges. The perforation on the stamps is the <u>most</u> important aspect of the stamp.

Also, remember when you are trimming stamps, please leave 1/4" edge around the stamp. This is important in encouraging proper handling of the stamps by our buyer.

Just send your trimmed canceled postage stamps with your zone president and she can bring them to our LWML Board meeting.

Praise God from Whom All Blessings Flow—the current amount raised so far from the stamp sales is: \$15,231.51!

What a blessing to have the opportunity to collect our stamps and help those we love, care about, and share Jesus with. Please continue in the Lord's mission as we serve the Lord with gladness!
